

Andalusian pre-to-post-aspiration and the life cycle of sound change

In this talk I analyze the change from pre- to post-aspirated /sp, st, sk/ clusters in Andalusian Spanish at the word boundary and within-words to assess whether post-aspiration has been lexicalized in the Western and / or Eastern varieties. The clusters were represented by voicing probability and high-frequency energy signals, i.e., proxies for the glottal and oral gestures needed to produce (intervocalic) aspirated voiceless plosives. The main modes of variation in the signals' shapes were analyzed with FPCA, which showed greater post-aspiration for younger than older speakers for within-word clusters, but not across word boundaries (with the only exception of the coronal cluster /st/). The results are unexpected in the context of the modular feed-forward approach to the life cycle of sound change, while exemplar theories might adapt better to the observed development.
